Think Out-ofthe-Box and Off-of-the-Bench Autism and Music Series by Sevy Phalangas

I appreciate being invited to reflect on my experience in teaching piano to students on the autism spectrum. I hope that I can impart some meaningful insight on a subject dear to my heart.

I have come to attribute the rewards I have gained and success I have seen with my students on the autism spectrum to my out-of-the-box and off-of-the-bench approach to piano/music instruction which I was already using, especially for young beginners. Working with children in different areas of the spectrum, as well as with other types of learning challenges, has not been about working in a separate world of techniques. It, in fact, has been about reinforcing personal philosophical principles on teaching and learning, magnifying areas that need to be isolated and addressed in order to effectively deliver to all students the different layers of music instruction at the cognitive level, motor-skill level, and expressive

level. Working with children on the spectrum has enlightened me to hone and intensify best practices for teaching anyone. This first article holds an overview of the philosophical and practical subjects I intend to cover in more detail in the upcoming articles on this series.

- 1. Without meaning to put up the peace signs and sound pretentious all of what you do as a mentor must come from the spirit of love and faith that everyone can learn, deserves to learn, deserves your best as a mentor, and deserves to be guided to feel the reward of accomplishment often in ways he never knew or expected. Some teachers and programs are too rigid and linear, and fail to recognize that teaching is not only about showing the student, it is also about finding the student and learning how to help him find his way holding his hand along the way.
- A successful teaching approach also recognizes the need for spontaneity – how to accommodate children's needs to move off of the bench, to accommodate their love of interaction and their shorter attention span.
- 3. Dealing with the multitude of concerns of parents with autistic children emphasized the importance of taking a holistic approach to teaching any student. It is important to keep antenna up for parent sentiments, temperaments, any family needs or issues and either explicitly address them with parents/student or implicitly direct one's lessons to embrace any challenge.
- 4. I feel blessed to be able to use music as a tool to not only enrich, but improve and strengthen people's lives. So much research has helped to validate and quantify the value of music education on many different levels. It is a perfect tool for autistic children because of the many ways we are wired for sound.
- 5. By the same token it is important to acknowledge with every student that, initially, we are all wired to fail in the playing of an instrument on a neurological and physical level. Showing simple examples to highlight this fact helps children understand why they are struggling and helps nurture patience to "re-wire themselves", practice and keep growing in their music development.
- Words matter. Through the years I have developed a dictionary's worth of vocabulary, which is kind,

understanding, and forgiving, but still addresses the demand for high standards – high standards for everyone, including those children on the spectrum. I have also developed symbols to cut through the symbols and simple cartoon-like pictographs that immediately get a complicated technical or intangible point across – I've been using my own P.E.C. and emoticon systems before those were defined!

7. Finally I would like to emphasize my mantra – teach toward a smile. A smile reveals a wealth of information. A smile reveals the "A-HA!" moment of revelation. It reveals a level of comfort and trust. It is a spontaneous reflex for showing pride in oneself. It is the affirmation of finding value, meaning, and joy in what we are doing.
